

Joanie Baloney: From Heart Patient to Farm Gal, Life is Good!

To look at Joanie now, one would never know she started out in a filthy puppy mill in Bartow County, Georgia. After the breeder died in 2006, the stock of small dogs was sold off at auction. Joanie was one of several lucky dogs that SCMR was able to rescue.

At four pounds, Joanie was a little underweight and had a serious heart murmur. But that didn't stop her from sparkling! Katherine Pfaff of Cross Creek Farms saw Joanie's picture on our web site and wanted to help her. With Katherine's financial assistance, Joanie was treated at the University of Tennessee's veterinary clinic. Dr. Karen Tobias performed Joanie's heart murmur surgery. And to the astonishment of the whole staff, Joanie was up and sparkling less than 24 hours later! Her effervescent spirit captivated all who came in contact with her.

One month later and one pound heavier, Joanie was well enough to complete her vetting. So Katherine drove to

TREATS FOR TRICKS!

Tail Waggers Dog Biscuits *by Susan Morin*

|--|-----------------------|
| 4 1/2 cups whole wheat flour | 2 Tbsp garlic powder |
| 3 cups all purpose flour | 2 tsp salt |
| 3 cups cornmeal | 3 1/2 cups beef broth |
| 1 1/2 cups oats | 1 cup vegetable oil |
| 2/3 cup bonemeal powder or nonfat dry milk | 2 large eggs |

Position oven racks to divide oven in thirds. Heat oven to 300 deg. Use 2 cookie sheets. Mix flours, cornmeal, oats, dry milk, garlic and salt in large bowl. Whisk broth, oil and eggs in medium size bowl. Stir broth mixture into flour - mix until blended and soft dough forms. Roll out dough on floured surface with rolling pin to 1/2 inch thickness. Cut into desired shapes with floured cutter. Place 1/2 inch apart on ungreased cookie sheets. Reroll and cut scraps. With toothpick prick a line of dots down the centers. Bake at 350 for about 35 minutes. Store in tight container for up to 3 months. Makes about 80, 4 inch biscuits.
